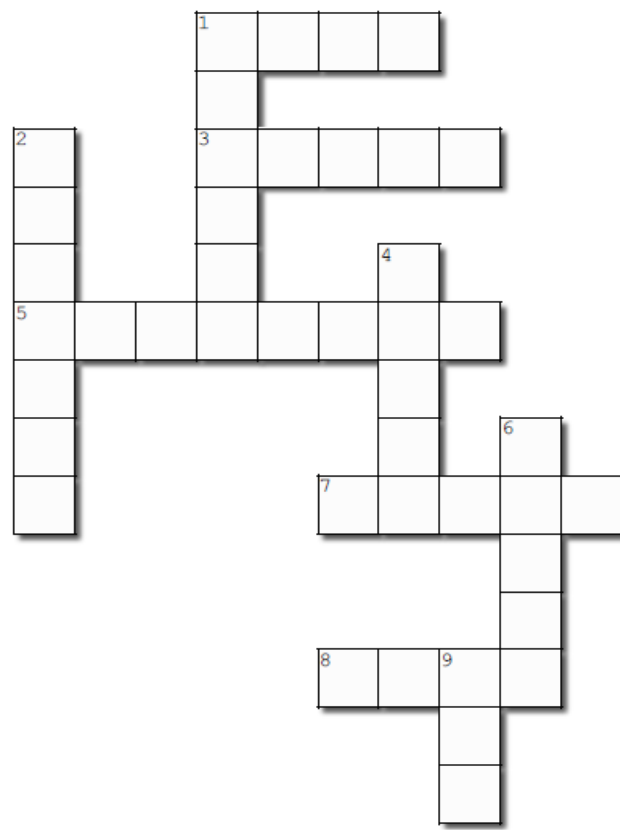

Upstairs, Juliet was getting ready for the ball with the help of her nurse when her mother came in.

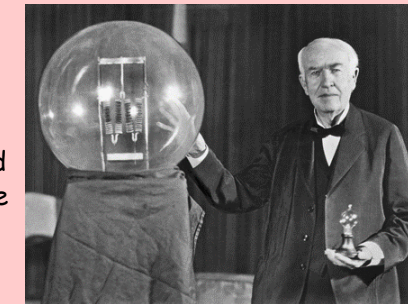
"Juliet," her mother said, taking her hand. "In just two weeks you will be 14, the same age I was when I had you...."

Victorian Inventions



The first picture was taken by Louis Daguer and this is photo is of Boulevard du Temple in 1838. It's also the first photo of a human being.



Other people in Britain had made electric lights before Thomas Edison. They were called arc lamps and were very bright but did not work for long.

So Edison created a lamp that would last 1200 hours, and he invented the screw fitting we use today to attach it. He also made the meters to track how much electricity we use each day.



The phonograph was invented in 1877 by Thomas Edison. While other inventors had produced devices that could record sounds, Edison's phonograph was the first to be able to reproduce the recorded sound. His phonograph originally recorded sound onto a tinfoil sheet wrapped around a rotating cylinder. A stylus responding to sound vibrations produced an up and down or hill-and-dale groove in the foil. Alexander Graham Bell's Volta Laboratory made several improvements in the 1880s, including the use of wax-coated cardboard cylinders, and a cutting stylus that moved from side to side in a "zig zag" groove around the record.

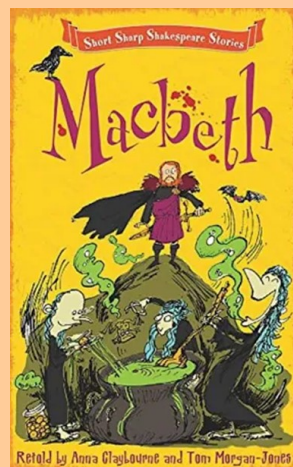
